




- promotes professionalism in the field of family literacy



Saskatchewan Literacy Network Knowledge Exchange 2012

This two-day annual provincial knowledge exchange provided learning, networking, and professional development opportunities for practitioners and adult learners across the province.

Ninety delegates came together to share their knowledge and learn from each other. A total of 20 sessions were hosted at the knowledge exchange, addressing topics that included "Taking Stock/Looking Forward: The End of the United Nations Literacy Decade" (Brigid Hayes) to "Connecting for Social Innovation Using Knowledge Mobilization" (David Phipps).

The Ministry of Education, Provincial Library and Literacy Office, sponsored a public series of social media presentations that allowed delegates and community members to learn more how to navigate the world of social media and working in an increasingly digitized environment.

Family Literacy Certificate Bursary


The Family Literacy Certificate Bursary fund was established in 2011 to provide Saskatchewan based literacy practitioners and community educators with a potential to gain a Family Literacy Program Certificate online through Vancouver Community College. Fifteen participants completed the course and had the opportunity to increase their knowledge and skills sets, preparing them to better design, develop, implement, and administer community based and school based family literacy programs.

Development of New Training – Introduction to Literacy






