



<u>Application Process</u>: The application forms are available in the fall on the Saskatchewan Literacy Network website www.sk.literacy.ca. Notices will also be posted in SLN e-News.

Criteria:

- 1. Must be a registered charitable organization, part of a school board, a rural municipality, or a public college.
- 2. Must offer a literacy program with the goal of enhancing and improving intergenerational literacy levels.
- 3. Must demonstrate the ability to develop other financial supports and community partners
- 4. Must use funds to provide direct service and/or purchase resources for family literacy programs.
- 5. Programs must be offered in partnership with organizations that provide literacy and learning opportunities for children and adults.

<u>Target</u>:

- 1. Funds support facilitation costs, fees for family literacy training, program resources (books), and support services (transportation, snacks, childcare).
- 2. The purchase of equipment or salary for administrative or support staff are not eligible for funding.

- 2. Grant recipients must be charitable organizations who have demonstrated innovative and creative ways of responding to the urgent needs of society.

Target:

1. Housing initiatives and adult education.

<u>Deadline</u>: Regional requests are reviewed every 6 – 8 weeks throughout the year; national and multi-year projects are reviewed every 12 – 16 weeks.

- 4. Programs that provide a tangible benefit to Canadian children at risk or in need and the communities where they live.

Target:

1. Children at risk or in need for future success through donations to improve their health, education and well-being in Canada.

<u>Deadline</u>: Reviews take place between February 1 and September 30 of each year. Proposals are reviewed approximately once a month and decisions can take up to 60 days; reviewed on an annual basis.

<u>Deadline</u>: Proposals for funding are reviewed twice per year. Application deadlines are January 15 for a mid-April decision and September 1st for a decision in early December.

- 1. Must be a K-8 public school that faces socio-economic factors, which put the children at higher risk.
- Grant monies are to be used on special projects they believe will promote literacy, such as after-school groups, special guest speakers, and anything that promotes the love of reading, such as the purchase of new books and learning materials for school-wide literacy projects.

 CIF funding programs support community initiatives that enhance human development and community vitality, focusing on development opportunities for children, youth and families, increased positive activities for young people at the local level, increased community youth leadership capacity, and inclusion of First Nations and Métis people as leaders in delivery of community activities.
